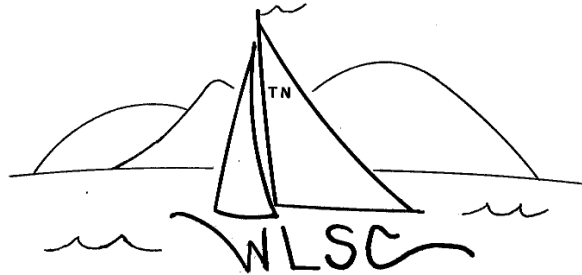

**Overnight Event on the Lake** – On Saturday June 12 we will have another overnight event on the lake. Be at the Lakeshore Marina dock at 6pm, bring something for your supper and breakfast, and join your fellow club members for a night anchored out.

**Spring Makeup Race** – The Second Spring Race was scheduled for May 2, but was called off due to the poor weather. It has been rescheduled to Sunday, June 13. As usual the skipper's meeting will be on the dock at 2pm, and the first horn will sound at 2:30.

**Commodore's Cup Race** – The Commodore's Cup Race will be held on Saturday afternoon, July 3. This is always a well-attended race. If your Sunday schedule has made you miss the regular races, this one will be on Saturday. If you have missed too many races in the Spring Series to get a prize, this is a stand-alone race with its own prizes. If you have never raced before, check out the club web site, [WLSC.lizards.net](http://WLSC.lizards.net), read the rules and sailing instructions, and come out and join us. The skipper's meeting will be on the dock at 2pm, and the first horn will sound at 2:30 for the 2:40 start.

**The Fourth of July Pig Roast** - The Pig Roast will be on the point across from Lakeshore Marina. To stake out our spot and get started, we will set up the portable dock and move most of our stuff there on Friday, July 2 starting at noon. It takes five or six people to do this, so if you have some spare time on Friday afternoon, come over and lend us a hand. Saturday morning we will lug all the stuff up the hill to the site leaving the afternoon free for the Commodore's Cup Race.

The meat will go on the fire at 7am Sunday morning, July 4 and cook all day. The cooking is a social event in itself. Bring a chair and a cooler, join the cooking crew, chop a little wood, tell sailing tales, and spend the day in the shade. We will fix a few chickens for lunch to make sure the cooking crew does not go hungry. Bring your water toys, and we will set up a rope swing for the more adventurous.

There will be a buoy line out if you want to bring your boat over, or you can ride across with Clarke Lucas. Contact him on channel 16 with a call to "No Wind". Use the radio on your boat, the one at the gas dock, or ask any other member to make the radio call for you. If you have your motor boat on the lake, you might give him a hand ferrying people over and back.

Supper will be served at 6:30. We will have pork and chicken barbecue, beans, slaw, french fries, hushpuppies, and small amounts of beer and sodas. Bring a desert to share, and you will be set. The charge will be \$5 per person. We will have food for about 90 people, so there is no need for reservations unless you plan to bring a crowd. If you do, call Adair Murdoch at 239-9108. We expect to have a big group this year because the Johnson City Sail & Power Squadron will join us for the evening's festivities.

Eat all you can, party all night, join us for the Overnight Event on the Lake, but help us clean up the mess on Monday morning. To kick off the clean up, we will have a pancake breakfast on the sailboat dock.
