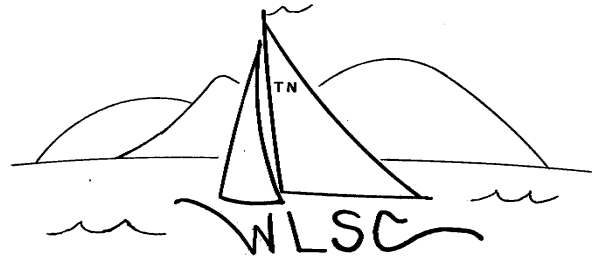

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First Fall Race Sails Sat., August 30 (Labor Day Weekend)

The first race of the fall PHRF series will be Saturday, August 30. As with all PHRF events this fall, skippers' meetings are at 1300 (1:00 p.m.), on the sail dock, with the 5-minute warning at 1410 (2:10 p.m.), race underway at 1415 (2:15 p.m.). The race sequence is being changed from 10 to 5 minutes and we will have a practice start beginning at 1400 (2:00 p.m.)

Followed by...

Annual Fish Fry and Overnight Raft-up Sat., August 30

Our traditional on-the-dock fish fry will be served to all comers following the first fall race. Crispy fried fish, Captain Bill's golden fried potatoes and tangy cole slaw will highlight the menu, but if members elect to bring a salad, side dish or desert, it wouldn't go unappreciated. A few soft and not-so-soft beverages will be available, but if you have a monumental thirst, it might be a good idea to bring a few extra for your crew. We're planning on providing food for about 40 hungry sailors (our usual attendance at this event), but if you intend on bringing a crowd, let the Murdochs know at wsmurdoch@aol.com.

As a component of the WLSC Economic Stimulus Package of 2008, costs for this event will be limited to \$3.00 per diner.

After the fish fry, we'll degrease, cast off the dock lines, and sail away for an overnigher at a nearby anchorage.

New Summer Fun Races a Smashing Success

In its first year ever, the WLSC recently completed a four-race summer fun-race series, and from all indications, the new summer races have been an unqualified success.

In years past, the sailing club went into summer doldrums following the final spring race due to the fluky or nonexistent wind and prevalent afternoon thunderstorms that typify mid-summer weather patterns on Watauga.

Long-time sailors, however, have long known that early on summer mornings, by about 8 a.m., a steady wind appears from the east, generated by convection currents produced by the slow warming of dense mountain land masses reacting with the more rapid warming of the water surface. As the warmer air rises above the lake, the cooler, more dense air slides down the ridges, producing a steady, predictable wind that generally averages between 7-15 knots – a perfect racing wind! By the time the temperatures equalize – around 11 a.m. – the wind virtually disappears and it's back to the dock for swimming and socializing. In a coastal area, this would be called a "land breeze," and it works the same way on Watauga Lake.

Though not the first to recognize this phenomenon, Race Captain James Little has been the first to play it to advantage in what has been an exciting and fun-filled summer race series. In each of the four summer races, we had anywhere from 10-15 boats racing round the buoys. Not bad, when one considers that folks planning to race by 8 a.m. had to leave home in sufficient time to arrive and be ready to race before most folks had had their morning coffee. An additional social benefit was that many racers chose to spend the night aboard Friday night, providing yet another opportunity for fellowship and camaraderie. Thanks and congratulations to all those who helped make the summer race series a success, and special thanks for the foresight and extra effort provided by Race Captain Little in establishing a new tradition that is sure to be a crowd pleaser for years to come.

Bathhouse Project Continues on Track
